While working with the Parker Aircraft Company, he took part in the Apollo space project until federal funds were withdrawn and the project ended. The Wyborneys moved back to the Wilbur area and he lived on the Harris farm northwest of town until he was able to find another aviation-oriented job. this time with the McCalloch comnany, headquartered at Lake Havasu City, Arizona. The family was there during the time of the construction of the London Bridge and the associated waterway.

While associated with McCulloch, Bob became the lead field engineer and was sent by the company to such places as Mexico, Colo-Brazil, Argentina, Ausand Canada, McCulloch craft Corporation built sold helicopters and planes.
