50th Anniversary

CELEBRATED GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY,  
1875-1925 WEDDING.

Last Sunday afternoon and evening the farm house of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Vybomy was the scene of a happy gathering. The occasion being the 50th anniversary of their wedding, the events being prepared and arranged by their children and their families. Among of their children and their families a large number of relatives, friends and neighbors were present to pay their respects to the aged couple. An appropriate talk was given by J. A. Dvorak following which there present partook of a splendid dinner and in the evening of the supper and also midnight repast.

Mr. and Mrs. Vybomy received many appropriate presents which they appreciate very much, more because of their sentimental worth and as tokens of sincere friendship.

It will not be amiss to recall a piece of history in connection with this rare occasion. The Vybomy family consisting of the parents and four sisters of Mr. Vybomy and also his grandfather, came to this country in 1868 and located in Ily, Iowa. In the spring of 1870 they set out with a team of oxen from Ily for this state and his father located on the homestead 1½ miles north of Taber which has been their home since. It might be mentioned that the elder Vybomy was one of the founders of Taber and its first mayor. He had been in business in Taber during the early years and spent the remaining years with his wife on the old homestead near Taber. He died on July 1, 1908, and his wife followed him to the great beyond two years later.

Mr. Vybomy was born on June 4, 1849 in Radovesice, Bohemia and was united in marriage to Miss Jeannine Charvet on April 13, 1865, establishing their home on the Vybomy homestead. Mrs. Vybomy was born in Chlasterice, Bohemia, on March 14, 1866. The Charvet family consisting of the parents and grandfather, Mrs. Vybomy and two sons, Anton (died 25 years ago), and Frank (on the old homestead south of Taber), came to this country in 1874 locating in New York. Ten years later the family moved to this state, Mrs. Vybomy's father buying the farm half a mile south of Taber of Joe Wampel, where they made their permanent home.

Both the elder Vybomys and Charvets lived to a ripe old age: Grandpa Vybomy at his death was 83 years of age; grandpa Vybomy 81; grandpa Charvet, 92 and grandpa Charvet 93 years.

It will be noted that the subjects of this sketch belong to the very early pioneers of this section, having gone through the privations and hard times of the pioneer days. They have many recollections of happy days and also days of sorrow. But they have been fortunate indeed to have been spared to the time when they might celebrate their golden wedding day surrounded by their loving and affectionate children and grandchildren, relatives and friends. They may look back upon their married life thru the entire fifty years with satisfaction and in truth say that they have lived and found life good and worth while. Perhaps the happy occasion was clouded with the moment that certain faces were missing. There were twelve children in the Vybomy family, five of which died between the ages of one and four years. Also the departed sister of Mr. Vybomy: Mrs. Jos. Tefel, whose husband lives in Ashland, Va.; Mrs. Louise Chladek, and Mrs. Anna Wille. Another of his sisters, Mrs. Josephine Stasik resides in Tupper, N. Dak. Mrs. Chladek's husband, Alois Chladek, was a member of the first expedition to these parts in 1862 for the purpose of finding Siberian colony. He died three years ago.

The children who arranged for the happy day are: Josephine (Mrs. J. A. Pekar); Kelen (Mrs. Frank Pesek); Marie of Omaha; Joseph; Elizabeth (Mrs. Albert Soukoda); George and Emma as bairns.
