Mrs. Ivan Wyborny: An appreciation.

In recent years a little more emphasis has been given in the programs of the day to the place and importance of motherhood in the home and other channels of life's activities, but no matter how elaborately these services are planned or how sincere those taking part may be in their expressions of appreciation, it is impossible to adequately and fully appreciate the mothers in the home until the experience comes which has been the lot of this family the past few days, namely when mother, seemingly so much needed by all, has passed out of our homes.

The notation therefore of the following dates and important events in the life of Mrs. Wyborny may be more or less of interest to neighbors and friends, but to the children of the home it will be a memory of the presence and influence of mother as she ministered unto their needs and gave her life in unselfish devotion.

Olive Rosella Helm was born in Mitchell County, Iowa, April 30, 1872. In her early womanhood the family moved to the farm three and one-half miles east of Plymouth now occupied by the Charles Eldridge family.

She was united in marriage to Ivan Wyborny, in April 1899. Mr. Wyborny preceded his wife in death December 22, 1927. Seven children were born unto them, two of whom passed away in infancy. The remaining children are Zella, now Mrs. Russell Eldridge of Mason City; Callie, now Mrs. Merit Bishop, of Floyd, Iowa; Verna, now Mrs. Wm. Bahnsen, east of Plymouth, Herbert at home and Kenneth of Mason City.

She is survived also by her sister, Mrs. M. W. Butts of Belle Fourche, South Dakota, and three brothers, Jasper of Osage, Iowa, E. I. of Rockford, Iowa, and Ernest of McMinnville, Oregon. Also seven grandchildren.

Last fall Mrs. Wyborny had a serious illness from which she never fully recovered. About two weeks before her death in company with her daughter Collie and husband, she made a visit to the home of her sister above mentioned. Here she was taken ill Saturday, August 17th, gradually growing worse until she passed on Saturday, August 24th, 1929.

Mrs. Wyborny was a member of the Rebekah Lodge.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, August 27, with brief services at the home at 1:30 followed by services at the Methodist Church at 2 p. m. conducted by the Rev. Wm. Galbreth.

The Ladies quartet composed of the following named person, Mesdames George Chesebro, Frank Pashak, Fay Cooper and J. Heironimus, accompanied by Ruth Galbreth, rendered comforting messages of song.

The body was laid to rest in the South Cemetery at Plymouth.
